Promoting a Green Agenda – Sustainable Travel

Being part of a project that aims to develop more sustainable farming systems may also bring certain expectations to one's own contribution to reduce CO₂-footprints. The workshop with **Prof. Yvonne Buckley** was inspiring and a great opportunity to develop strategies to reduce the environmental impact caused by the LegumeLegacy project. Engaging discussions were held and many ideas were presented, such as establishing travel guidelines encouraging transport by train instead of plane. This shift could be better facilitated by choosing central locations for our training events. Also the significance of networking and communication at conferences was discussed, aspects that can become constrained in online settings. The overarching goal is to implement key ideas in the daily life of the participants as well as for future meetings and workshops.



Doctoral Researcher Forum

The Dublin event was not only the first time the doctoral researchers met in person, but also the first time they came together in the Doctoral Researcher Forum. In this setting, the doctoral researchers can discuss consortium wide activities, provide and receive peer support, take on tasks regarding social media and communication, and raise any questions and concerns. It is also a great chance to learn management and organization skills, especially for the two chairs. For this year, Rouven Lattner and Meret Kaspereit have been elected as chairs, and all doctoral researchers have taken on responsibilities for different communication channels.

Presentation Skills

As a researcher, the ability to conduct good research is of greatest importance. But in order to make impactful improvements and changes, the results must be communicated to other scientists as well as the wider public in a skilled manner. The training in presentation skills provided by **Frank Sweeney** will therefore be highly valuable for the DRs during their journey of becoming successful researchers. Highlights of the Training Event and a New Website





Research Training and Transferable Skills

A major part of the training event was aimed at providing Doctoral Researchers with tailored interdisciplinary and intersectoral training in advanced research and transferable skills. Two of our Principal Investigators and one project partner – Dr. Nyncke Hoekstra, Dr. Carsten Malisch, and Dr. Patrick Cashman - shared insights into their journey of transitioning from a Ph.D. to roles in academia and industry, emphasizing challenges, successes, and uncertainties in terms of family and career planning. Additionally, the DRs received specialized training by the ADAPT Research Centre at Trinity College Dublin, which covered topics in Open science and data management practices, Communication & Dissemination skills, Intellectual Property, as well as Bias, gender and intercultural issues training. The week concluded with training in Statistics and Data Science, delivered by Prof. Caroline Brophy and Dr. Matthias Suter. The training provided our doctoral researchers with essential skills in quantitative analysis and statistical thinking which they will be able to directly apply to their individual Ph.D. projects.

Diversity-Interactions Models

Modelling the relationship between diversity and ecosystem functions is a complex task and will also be an important part of the LegumeLegacy project. A recently launched website by Prof. Caroline Brophy, provides useful information and tools on what Diversity Interaction (DI) models are, why they are used and how they can be interpreted.
